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Cost for the event (which includes a small lunch) is \$10 for Scouts and \$5 for adults who want the patch and lunch. For those from out of town, troops may camp at Camp McClintock on Friday night and/or Saturday night (<http://www.cherokeesbsa.org/camps/index.html>).

Registration starts at 7:30 am with the opening ceremony at 8:00. Four different sessions are held during the day, so that most Scouts will work on four merit badges. If Scouts take a couple of Eagle required and a couple of optional merit badges each year, they will progress well toward their Eagle rank requirements.

A few of the sessions require two periods (First Aid, Swimming, and Emergency Preparedness) due to the length of time to cover the requirements. A couple of sessions will cover parts of two merit badges (Hiking/Backpacking, and Family Life/Genealogy.) The event will conclude at 5:15 p.m. ending with a joint assembly for all people attending.

Registration of all attending is needed prior to February 8th, to ensure that instructors can be ready for the planned session size. All information for registration is on the Council website

(<http://www.cherokeesbsa.org/activities/wintermeritbadge/index.html>). Registration consists of a form for each Scout detailing what the first and second choice is for each session (there are 19 choices for each of the four sessions) and a form detailing the troop information. Payment is needed at the time of registration.

Some merit badges will be completed during the time at the Festival, and many will not. The Council web site details what requirements should be completed before the event, which requirements will be completed during the event, and which requirements will be done after the event.

Winter Merit Badge Festival February 16, 2008

The council Merit Badge Festival is held this year on Saturday, February 16th at the Tri-County Technical Center in Bartlesville. Scouts will have the opportunity to earn merit badges from a selection of 35 different merit badges.

Thirteen Eagle required merit badges are offered including at least one of each of the twelve merit badges required to achieve the Eagle rank. Twenty-two optional merit badges are offered.

In some cases participation will not be possible without doing the preliminary requirements (such as a swimming test prior to the swimming merit badge session, or bringing skates or a musical instrument to the skating or music merit badge sessions.) Please ensure that your Scouts are prepared for the merit badge sessions prior to attending by reviewing the information on pre-requisite requirements.

Adult training will be offered during the festival for the leaders that attend. This is a great time to get certified on some of the needed items for tour permits such as Safe Swim Defense, Safety Afloat, Leader Specific Fast Start, and Youth Protection. Other adult leader classes include:

Wood Badge SR-898 September 19-21 and October 3-5

Wood Badge is Scouting's premier training course for Cub Scout, Boy Scout, Varsity Scout, and Venturing Leaders, as well as council and district leaders. The primary purpose of the Wood Badge experience is to strengthen Scouting in packs, troops, crews, districts, and the council.



Wood Badge for the 21st Century teaches the latest team leadership skills and gives each participant the opportunity to put their newly learned skills into practice through the patrol method.

This is a two weekend outdoor experience where participants will live Scouting. The first weekend is September 19-21. The second weekend is October 3-5.

The course begins at 8:00 AM on Friday morning each weekend and concludes at 5:00 PM on Sunday afternoon. The 1st weekend of the course utilizes a classroom environment and practical exercises to teach the essentials of leadership. The 2nd weekend offers classroom and outdoor experiences to help participants apply the leadership skills they have learned.

Participants must attend both weekends and participate in all sessions. In addition, participants will need to attend one or more meetings their patrol schedules between the course weekends. Finally, participants will write and complete a Ticket. The Ticket consists of five written goals. These goals connect the participant's new leadership knowledge to their role in Scouting.

Participants are invited to attend Wood Badge if they are at least 18 years of age and are a registered Scout leader. This includes Men and Women Scouters in a Pack, Troop, Crew, Team, District or Council position that have completed the basic training courses: New Leader Essentials and Position Specific for their scouting position in Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting, Venture, or Varsity Scouting.

The course fees are \$195 if paid in full before May 30, 2008. Balances paid after May 30 will be \$220. The fee covers meals for both weekends, course hat, course T-shirt, supplies, materials, camp and copyright fees.

Friends of Scouting

This is the time of year when the families of the Scouts are given the opportunity to support the council as a part of the annual FOS effort. **Each unit in the Cherokee Area Council that participates in the FOS campaign qualifies for free rank advancement patches.** It's as easy as 1-2-3. Here's how to do it!

1. Pick a date in February, March or April for a Friends of Scouting volunteer to come and give a short (10-12 minute) presentation. The best times are Blue and Gold banquets and Courts of Honor. Contact the Scout Office to schedule your FOS presentation.
2. Pick a parent or other volunteer to serve as your unit's FOS chair. This person will coordinate the campaign in your unit and ensure that every family has the opportunity to support Scouting.
3. Let the parents know the date of the presentation, put it on the front end of the agenda and promote their support and participation.

When your unit participates in the F.O.S. campaign, you will be helping to ensure a bright future for your unit and the entire Cherokee Area Council.

2009 Sea Base Registration Closes February 15th

Now is the time to register for 2009 adventures to BSA National High Adventure Sea Base in the Florida Keys.

This is a great first adventure for Scouts, who have to be 14 by September 1, 2009, in order to attend. You can find out information on the web at their site

www.bsaseabase.org/ .

Sea Base has a on-line registration process with a lottery to see who gets the adventures. You must



register by February 15th for these adventures to have the best chance of getting the dates you want.

In order to register if your troop doesn't already have an account, you are going to need your Scout leader id number (which is on your

registration card - or call the Scout Office if you don't have this handy.)

If you don't get the crew through the lottery, check their list of available adventures, as typically all of them don't get used, and some people release them when a conflict comes up for the unit.

Oklahoma Boating Education

Any person who is 12, 13, 14 or 15 years of age that operates any boat powered by a motor more than 10 horsepower, a sailboat 16 feet or greater in length or a personal watercraft is required to successfully complete a boating safety education class.

You must successfully complete a National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA) approved boating safety course. If you pass the course, a card will be issued to you. Carry this card with you when operating your boat or personal watercraft.



If you are operating a motor boat or sailboat, you must have an adult 18 years of age or older on board the boat with you in a position to take control of the boat if necessary.

If you are on a personal watercraft, you must be visually supervised by an adult 18 years of age or older within 500 yards of where you are operating your personal watercraft.



The Oklahoma Highway Patrol offers a free 6-hour classroom course. Call toll free, 877-253-2820 or log on to <http://www.okboated.com/map.html> to find a course near you. Courses fill up quickly. Pre-registration is recommended.

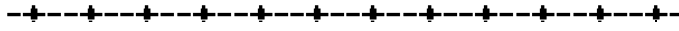
